We are sad to announce that Kathy Babich passed away February 27. Kathy was an active member of our group. We will miss her.

A Look Back

Fundraising became a high priority for the Women's College Club in the early 1920s. Subscription dances (sponsored jointly with the Princeton Hospital Committee) were popular and brought in added revenue (a dance in 1921 netted the Women's College Club \$350!). At one dance, held in Thomson Hall, the Farr Hardware orchestra played and a campus policeman took tickets at the door. Mothers brought their daughters and chaperoned from seats along the wall. For couples desiring conversation, a few chairs and potted palms decorated what eventually became the police court when the building became Borough Hall in 1936. The building was demolished in 1973.

Sandwiches sold at football games added to the Club's coffers. One of the Club's former presidents tells of making hundreds of sandwiches to be sold at a University reunion. Unhappily, so few were sold that she and her husband filled cartons and clothes baskets with unsold sandwiches and dumped them at midnight into the piggery of a farm where Princeton Hospital once stood at the intersection of Witherspoon Street and Franklin Avenue. Quite a feast for those pigs!

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

This month we will be highlighting **Carol Stokes.**

Carol Stokes grew up in Princeton, and lived on a working farm. She said that when she got home from school her job was to collect



the eggs in the hen house – which she dreaded because the broody hens stayed on their eggs and would peck her hand! The first thing she ever drove was a John Deere tractor.

Carol went to Miss Fine's School (which, together with the boys' Princeton Country Day school, became the Princeton Day School). In those days, dancing class was a standard activity in 7th and 8th grade. Bob Hillier was in the same one as Carol, and she remembers that together they won the class prize for dancing the Charleston!

After 9th grade, Carol's parents decided to send her to boarding school, and Carol spent three wonderful years at Oakwood Friends School in Poughkeepsie, NY, a Quaker co-ed school with children literally from all over the world and all walks of life. Carol said that in her junior year the two girls in the dorm room across from hers were Bette Davis' niece and Lena Horne's daughter!

After attending Douglass College Carol decided that she wanted to see the West Coast, so she and another girl drove her '49 Dodge first to San Francisco, where a friend had moved. They decided it was too much like the East, so they headed south and ended up in San Diego where an aunt lived. It was there that she met and eventually married Jack Tibbetts, a Navy pilot.

After 5 years, three years of which were spent in Corpus Christie, Texas, Jack decided to leave the Navy and fly for Eastern Airlines – and they ended up moving to Lawrenceville! They divorced about 8 years later and several years after that Carol went back to her maiden name.

Following in her mother's footsteps, Carol joined the Present Day Club in 1967, where she became President in 2006 (with Janet Reiche as her VP!). For roughly 40 years Carol was president of the board of trustees of the Carolyn Stokes Preschool, a non-profit in West Trenton.

In 1996 Carol decided to volunteer with The Exchange Club, which was focused on helping the homeless families housed in the US 1 motels. Yes, today it's called HomeFront and Carol ended up being their grant writer for about 20 years!

Carol's son and his wife live in Ewing, and her daughter and two grandchildren are in Colorado. Carol is so thankful that fate brought her back to Princeton, where she continues to enjoy a variety of activities and amenities.


